Regulation Not Regimentation

The fight against the Zoning and Planning Bill and the Bill for Reduction of County Commissioners, sponsored by "Citizens Committee" of Anne Arundel County, of which Mr. Edgar S. Kalb, of Mayo, is the chairman, should have the attention of every property owner of the County.

Anne Arundel County has made great progress in development of its beautiful land and resources during the past twelve years and will continue to great achievement if allowed to proceed along the same course now employed. There is no need to have any regulations not fully controlled by County authority. A reduction of the number of County Commissioners at this time when their duties are becoming more extended would cause confusion and delay important developments. The districts as now represented should be divided and the number of commissioners increased.

True, there must be regulations, and there are at present, laws, that if enforced, will better take care of developments in the County than will the Zoning and Planning Bill now proposed.

It would be well to have created at the next session of Legislature a County property or park board with authority to look forward to the making of public recreation grounds and development of County real estate, which with careful study could convert much of the land now owned by the County into a great asset.

The United States of America became great, because of the few restrictions placed upon its citizens; and the composite intelligence of all its people have aided in its greatness. Rule by commissions have proved good only where there as no other governmental process possible and then only until a democratic process could be formed.

With improvement and civic associations in every community, Anne Arundel County is proceeding orderly, soundly and happily ahead. Roads, schools and public utilities are keeping pace. Its greatest need now is the enforcement of the laws and rules of the Department of Health and more police protection. If there is more money to spend let these departments be brought forward to full efficiency.

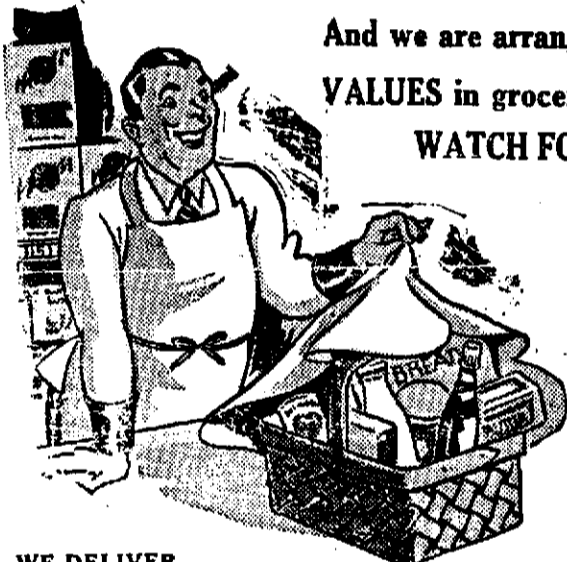

John W. Schepf Opens New Restaurant And Quick Lunch

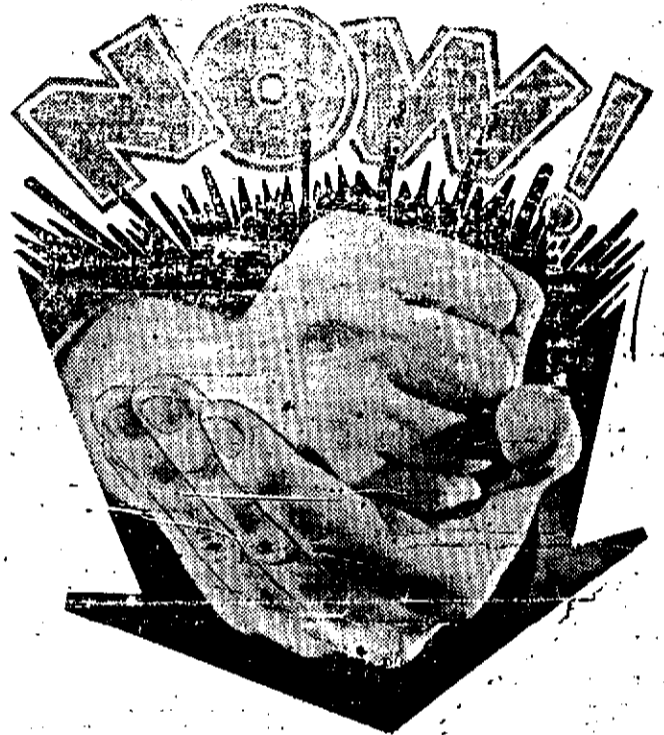

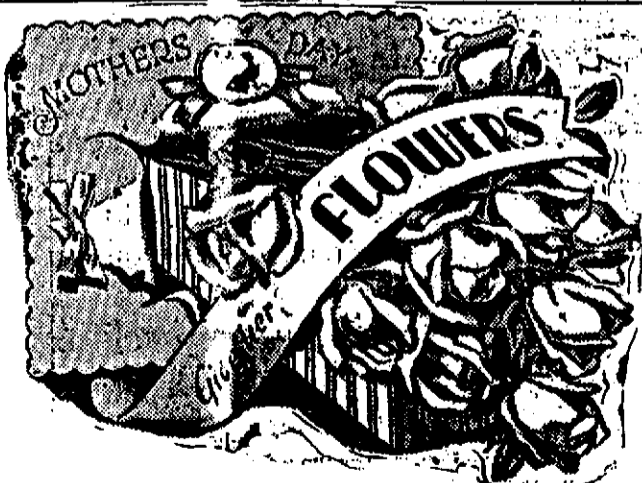

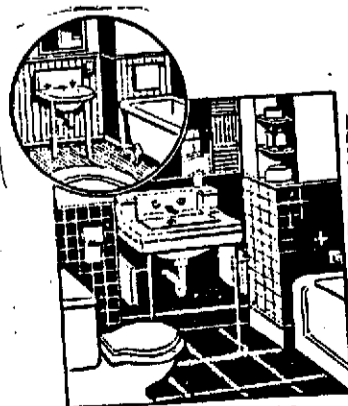
